The red car is longest.



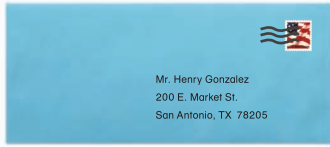

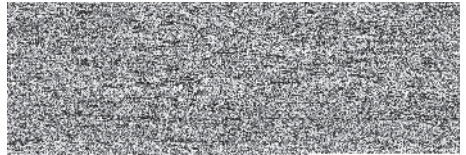
